### **UNAIDS to release new Global AIDS Epidemic Update report for World AIDS Day**

#### ***Global Number of People Living with HIV Reaches Highest Level Ever***

UNAIDS will present data from the new UNAIDS/WHO report, *AIDS epidemic Update 2004*, highlighting the global and regional estimates on AIDS and new trends in the epidemic's evolution. There will be a special focus on women, girls, HIV and AIDS — the theme of the World AIDS Campaign 2004 (including World AIDS Day – 1 December).

Key findings of the new report will be discussed including:

- Prevention programmes urgently needed for women and girls to slow spread of AIDS
- The number of women living with HIV has risen in every region over past two years
- Diverse epidemics are underway in various regions, some still in early stages
- Epidemics growing rapidly in Eastern Europe, Central Asia and East Asia—mainly driven by injection drug use and unsafe sex
